




















Languages

Technologies

Children, Family & the Community



Aviation

Just as first Term began, Channel Nine visited the school to do a feature piece on the Aviation Specialist Program Drone course in conjunction with Global Drones. Year 11 students, Jetling Chong, Diya Ravjee and Arielle Plottke starred by showing off their UAV flying skills for the cameras.

The Year 7 students have started their Aviation studies excellently, and are 'up to speed' with Aerodynamics. They are also fine-tuning

their Flight Sim skills. Many have completed PEX (Pilot Experience) flights to Rottnest Island or the

City with Mr McGinn.

The Year 8 students have been busy studying flight instruments, and the Year 9 students have been introduced to UAVs (drones). A number of students have been completing TIFs (Trial Intro Flights) with Ms Stacey and Mr Brink. Flying lessons are also being undertaken by these students, with the aim for students being a RPL or PPL licences.

The Year 10 students have been concentrating on the all-important practical aspects of aircraft loading and flight planning, with a number of students inching their way towards their first solo.

Year 11 and 12 students have consolidated their knowledge of Aerodynamics and Instrumentation and had the opportunity to visit the DBCA (Dept of Biodiversity, Conservation & Attractions-Dept of Parks & Wildlife) base at Jandakot Airport. The Chief Pilot explained the benefits of working and flying for the department, and students could get a closeup of the two Piper Scouts parked in the hangar used for aerial spotting and surveillance.

Before the excursion, The Assistant Fire Operations Officer, Afie Jazreen (an ex-Melville SHS student), gave Years 9, 11 & 12 students a good insight into what goes on behind the scenes when fires break out anywhere in the State.

The MASC parent support group held its AGM in Week 7 which was attended by enthusiastic parents. Mr Kai Chong is continuing as President for another year, and a committee has been formed. Thank you to all those who have volunteered

their time.

It has been a busy term in Year 11 General Food Science and Technology. Students learnt about essential laws and regulatory codes associated with food preparation and practical precision cutting skills such as julienne, brunoise and chiffonade. In the second half of the term, the focus was on local foods, and students produced a pizza using as much local produce as possible. Science


As Term 1 comes to a close, the Science team was grateful for the opportunity to talk with parents about student progress during the Parent-Teacher interviews that took place in Week 9.

Sculpture by the Sea Excursion

She also talked to the students about Nyoongar history in the area and referenced oral stories that date back to 6000yrs ago when the megafauna was still wandering around with the Aboriginal

The students felt the experience was worthwhile, providing a 'real life' view of sculptures, building on their art vocabulary and giving them some tools to interpret the meaning of the artworks.

The Centenarian Portrait Project

Congratulation to Year 12 Visual Art students Carys Creed and Irish Regner for being selected to participate and exhibit their portrait works in The Centenarian Portrait Project by Teenagers.

The national community arts project promotes intergenerational friendships, celebrates life at 100 and fights the negative ageing stigma.

The program aims to involve up to 100 teenage artists and 100 centenarians who undergo a

life-affirming intergenerational process. This culminates in an art exhibition of the finished portraits. For most artists, it is a chance to meet a centenarian for the first time; for centenarian subjects, an opportunity to share their story and, for both generations, a

memorable perspectives.

Each artist is matched with their subject geographically or linguistically. The artists commit to visiting their subject four times. This gives the pair time to engage and participate in the program while mapping out sketches, taking photos and playing the occasional game of dominos. The artists then return to their studios to complete their artwork. The centenarians are gifted their portrait as a keepsake.



Ensemble Day with CASSWA


