Students work in groups to



Science

Titration Exam

At the end of Term 1, Year 12 ATAR Chemistry students conducted titration of an unknown sample containing a mixture of sugar and citric acid.

This process, under exam conditions, involved students working with precise equipment, standardised solutions and using coloured indicators to determine the exact amount of reactant that was used to neutralise the citric acid. Once their data was collected, they analysed their results to determine the original percentage of sugar mixed with citric acid.

Catapulting through Year 7

The Year 7s have been looking into Simple Machines and were challenged to construct a catapult.

A catapult is a mechanism that forcefully propels projectiles, originally used mainly as a military weapon since ancient times. In this formidable weapon, the long end of an arm on a pivot is hauled or winched down and then released, allowing a heavy counterweight at the short opposite end of the arm to drop and swing the long end upward through a vertical arc.

The students also had an opportunity to examine Australia's first inventors, Indigenous Australians, and their invention, the Woomera.

The Wommera is also commonly known as a spear thrower or Miru. It is a weapon that uses leverage to achieve greater velocity and distance in spear-throwing.

The throwing arm and the aboriginal Woomera act as a lever. The spear-thrower is a low-mass, fast-moving extension of the throwing arm, increasing the length of the lever. This extra length allows the thrower to impart force to the spear over a longer distance, allowing greater force results in higher speeds and greater distance.


Other modern mechanisms using hydraulic pressure, tension, or other force to launch gliders, aircraft, or missiles, are also called catapults.












Titration is the chemical analysis process in which the quantity of some constituent of a sample is determined by adding to the measured sample an exactly known quantity of another substance with which the desired constituent reacts in a definite, known proportion.

Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge

Bebras is an international initiative to promote Computer Science among school students and engages students' computational thinking and problem-solving skills in a fun, interactive environment.

Gifted and Talented students from Years 7 to 10 participated in the Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge this term. This international initiative started in 2004 in Lithuania and is now worldwide, with over 50,000 participants last year. 'Bebras' is Lithuanian for beaver and was chosen because they represent a strong work ethic and collaborative behaviour.

The event consists of 15 challenging questions to be completed in a 45-minute online session. The photos opposite top right show the concentration required. Congratulations to the following students who achieved top results:

It allows students the opportunity to design and produce articles that are practical and sustainable. Students are encouraged to use and express their creativity in all their textile projects.

Baby Think It Over

The Baby Think It Over Program uses simulated real-life experiences to address pregnancy, healthy choices, basic infant care, parenting and issues such as foetal alcohol syndrome (FAS) and shaken baby syndrome.

In Week 8, the Year 11 Children, Family and the Community class had the opportunity to experience what it is like to be pregnant by wearing a pregnancy profile simulator vest. They were responsible for caring for a "real care" baby.

These babies are computerised life-sized infants that need to be fed, burped, rocked and have their nappy changed. Students cared for the baby for two days and two nights, giving them a taste of what it is like to care for a newborn baby. Some of the tired 'parents' are pictured top right.

Aviation

One of our ex-students is currently doing his Commercial Pilot Licence (CPL) training at the former location. This is planned for Term 3

before they finish their formal classes.

RAAF Aviation Motivation Program

We hosted three members of the RAAF in May, who are based at Amberley Air Base in Queensland. They allowed our Aviation students to fly an F-18 Hornet VR simulator above a location in Europe, where they were challenged to pass under a 30-foot-high bridge! Several students (and staff) were successful, and one senior school student even succeeded in flying it inverted.

The RAAF personnel also delivered a presentation to year groups, which covered the Officer Aviation specific roles, e.g. Officer Aviation, Pilot, ATC, Maritime Patrol and Response Officer et al. They were very impressed with our students and are happy to visit again in the future.

Perth Terminal Control Unit and Qantas Excursion

Year 11s and 12s have been fortunate to observe the TCU (part of Air Traffic Control) at Perth Airport this month, followed by lunch and a Q&A session at the Alpha building with various Qantas representatives (pictured bottom right). Students heard first-hand experiences from Pilots, Engineers,

> Cabin Crew and Operations. It was a fantastic opportunity to see and hear about industry practices.

St George's Art Exhibition



expertise in story structure and film techniques, is drawn from his role as Head of Film at Murdoch University and significantly shaped the students' projects.


The masterclass led by

Thank you to John McMullan and classroom teacher Ms Jenna Antoniolli, for facilitating the Year 10s learning on this project.




















Languages

Years 7 and 8 students

Learning Chinese characters can he challenging due to their complex structures and strokes. However, creative and tactile methods can help make learning more engaging and memorable. In Term 2, Years 7 and 8, Chinese language students enjoyed creating Chinese characters and sentences using pasta, mini match sticks and pompoms. 

The Year 10 students benefit from actively engaging in collective activities to experience success as they contribute to the common goals and see their ideas valued by their peers. The students enjoy exchanging and sharing their experiences and ideas.

This year, the regional round (WA, ACT and NT Division) was held at the Confucius Institute of UWA on the 9th of May. Our Year 11 ATAR Chinese Second Language student Merry (Phuong Thy) Huynh, participated in the competitive competition organised by the China Australia Friendship Society of WA (ACFSWA) held this year. Our principal, Kylie Bottcher, was a VIP, and Ms Stephanie Wignell and Ms Hua Li attended the competition.

Before the competition, MostWA Media Company organised for the public to vote for their favourite contestant to win the Popularity Award by viewing the contestants' two-minute videos published on different social media platforms (WeChat, Facebook, and Instagram). In Merry's short video, she gracefully and skilfully danced a traditional Chinese fan dance, wearing a beautiful Hanfu (traditional Chinese attire). Chinese Fan dance has been an expressive Chinese folk dance in China for about 3000 years. The fans, used as props, complement the expressive movements of the dancers and make dancers' limbs look longer and more delicate. Merry's graceful Chinese fan dance was warmly received by public viewers on social media. Merry led the votes by far, achieving 963 'Thumbs Up', 625 'Forward' (the video) and 872 'Like' on WeChat, the most popular Chinese social media platform.

Merry had been sick before the competition and had to juggle between her Year 11 ATAR Semester One exams and the competition, so she delivered her speech, online quiz, and dance well. Congratulations to Year 7 student Cherumoozhick al (Thomas) Biju, who was selected for the Sport WA Cricket 12'S Team that played in Darwin in Week 7.

Also, congratulations to Year 9 student Amelia Curd who won the Equestrian State Championships in the Term 1 school holidays. Amelia represented the school at the Equestrian WA 2023 Interschool State Championships riding her coach's horse held at the State Equestrian Centre. She competed in two Dressage Tests.

In her first Preliminary test, they placed 13th out of 25 riders, scoring 66.071% (a score over 60% is outstanding). In the second test, they placed first out of 12 riders with a score of 74.167% (a PB for Amelia). For both tests, Amelia received positive feedback from the judges on her combinations and execution. It is the first time a Melville SHS student has competed at an equestrian event, and a first-place finish is an exceptional effort.

Blanket Activity

Over the course of Week 3, students in Years 7 and 9 have been participating in an incursion, 'Koora Waangkininy Boodjar' (Blanket Activity). Koora Waangkininy Boodjar is presented by Aboriginal Support Coordinators, Charmaine Climo and Renarta Coyne. This incursion has been developed by Charmaine to suit Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people of Australia, particularly Western Australia, engaging people with an interactive learning experience that explores the history of Aboriginal peoples.

Koora Waangkininy Boodjar begins with multiple rugs arranged on the floor to represent Australia before the arrival of European Settlers. This incursion takes students on an immersive exploration of the nation-to-nation relationship with Aboriginal peoples, working towards reconciliation and empowering people to build bridges of understanding and respect. Koora Waangkininy Boodjar is an experiential teaching tool designed to share the historical and contemporary relationships between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people of Australia.

Social Media Incursion

In Week 9, the Year 9 and 10 students explored how exposure to se*ual imagery contributes to a distorted view of bodies, relationships and se*uality. Students evaluated how these messages harm their view of themselves, their bodies and their relationships and negatively impact their physical, emotional and social development.
